If you are optimistic, you are hopeful and look at things in a positive way. Challenge your child to be optimistic about something they usually complain about.

lament

If you lament something, you say how sad you are about it.

Ask your child to write a poem lamenting something they might be sad about. Then discuss things they could do to feel better about it.

If you are steadfast in doing something, you will not give up or be stopped from

Ask your child what things they are steadfast about. Discuss other possibilities.

decisive

If you are decisive, you make decisions quickly without changing your mind later. In the morning, ask your child to choose their clothing for the day in a decisive way.

gratifying

Something gratifying makes you feel happy and proud of what you've done.

Ask your child to make a list of "Most Gratifying Activities." Ask them to explain why these activities made the list.

resigned

If you are resigned to a bad situation, you accept it without complaining because you can't change it.

Challenge your child to act resigned to something they don't like but have to do.
